FATHERLESSNESS IN NEW HAMPSHIRE

Fatherhood is foundational to strong families, and strong families are essential to a strong Nation. An absent father affects all aspects of a child's life, including socio-cognitive development, socio-emotional development, academic performance, and criminality. Unfortunately, the effects of fatherlessness are far too visible throughout America, including in New Hampshire.

THE PREVALENCE OF FATHERLESSNESS

- Approximately 18.4 million <u>children in the U.S.</u> live without a biological father, stepfather, or adoptive father present in the home.
- 23% of U.S. children are raised by a single parent, which is the highest rate in the world and more than three times the <u>world</u> <u>average</u> of 7%.
- Nationally, 80% of single-parent homes are led by single mothers with an absent father.
- 28% of children in New Hampshire are living in <u>single-parent</u> <u>households.</u>
- 1,091 <u>children reside in foster care</u> in New Hampshire.

FATHERLESSNESS, CHILD DEVELOPMENT, AND EDUCATION

- A U.S. Department of Justice Briefing suggests <u>85% of children</u> who exhibit behavior disorders are from fatherless homes.
- National data suggests fatherless children are <u>279% times more</u> <u>likely</u> to carry guns and deal drugs than their peers.
- 63% of New Hampshire 4th-graders <u>scored "below proficient"</u> in reading for their grade level.
- 60% of New Hampshire 4th-graders <u>scored "below proficient"</u> in mathematics for their grade level.

FATHERLESSNESS, POVERTY, AND GOVERNMENT DEPENDENCE

- Fatherless children are <u>four times more likely</u> to live in poverty.
 - Approximately 23,655 <u>children live in poverty</u>—15% of all children in New Hampshire.
 - 37,000 children are in families <u>receiving public assistance</u> in New Hampshire.
